Types of Sentences

There are four types of sentences: statements, questions, commands, and exclamations. Each type of sentence is used for a different purpose.

Statement: A statement gives information or tells something.

- The young woman bought two tickets to Friday's rock concert.
- Mount McKinley is North America's highest mountain.
- Too much fat in your diet is unhealthy.

Question: A question asks for or about something.

- Where is my math book?
- Will you go to the concert with me?

In most cases, the subject comes before a predicate in a sentence. In a question, though, this order is reversed. It can make it more difficult to find the subject. You can find the subject more easily if you change the order of the words in a question into a statement.

Command: A command states an order or a request.

- Shut the door. Move, please.
- Get away from there this minute.
- Don't go near the edge of the cliff.

These sentences seem to have predicates but no subjects. The subject is actually you. *You* is understood without being directly stated.

Exclamation: An exclamation is an expression of excitement or surprise. As in a command, certain words that are understood may be left out of an exclamation. As in a question, changing the order of the words in an exclamation may help you find the subject.

- Fire!
- Wonderful!
- What a great movie!

Pronouns

Nouns make writing precise. They tell the reader specifically who or what is being discussed. Occasionally, however, too many nouns can make writing dull.

In the following paragraph, two nouns, *Jevon and mechanics*, are overused. The writing is repetitive and dull. The writing can be improved by replacing some of the nouns with pronouns. Look how pronouns can improve the paragraph.

A pronoun is a word that replaces and refers to a noun. It is used in exactly the same way as the noun it replaces. There are four kinds of pronouns: subject pronouns, possessive pronouns, object pronouns, and reflexive pronouns.

Subject Pronouns

A subject pronoun replaces a noun that is used as a subject.

- The Cowboys are my favorite football players.
- They are my favorite football players.

Pronouns have singular and plural forms. These are the forms for subject pronouns.

Singular	Plural
I	we
you	you
he, she, it	they

Nouns and pronouns are often joined with **and** or **or**. Sometimes it may be difficult to know what kind of pronoun to use with the noun. (Remember, subject pronouns are used only to replace a subject or part of a subject.)

If you're not sure which type of pronoun is correct when a pronoun appears with a noun, try thinking of the pronoun by itself in the sentence.

- Lee and Frank are absent today.
- (He, Him) and Frank are absent today.
